

### Further consideration of Derogations from Regulation (EC) 561/2006

### **Briefing Paper**

February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2010

### Background

Regulation (EC) 561/2006 refers to the harmonisation of certain social legislation relating to road transport. It amends Council Regulations (EEC) No 3821/98 and repeals Council Regulation (EEC) No 3820/85. The Regulation entered into force on 11 April 2007<sup>i</sup>.

### **Exemptions and Derogations**

The legislation provides a list of vehicles which are exempt under the legislation. There is also a list of derogations that Member States can exclude from the rules within their own territories.

In order to provide clarity on these and what they mean in practice, descriptions of the old exemptions  $vis \ avis$  the new exemptions and the old derogations  $vis \ avis$  the new derogations are listed in Appendix 1<sup>ii</sup>.

# Comparable derogations in other regions that matches the needs of the bakers.

Further research has not uncovered any additional examples of derogations that have been granted by other European countries.

#### Comment on meeting with Linwoods and Irwins

The last paragraph of the notes of the meeting with Linwoods and Irwins indicate that the DoE has already referred this matter to the Department for Transport (DFT) for consideration. Given the notes also indicate that there is uncertainty about the content of the case presented by the DoE the Committee may wish to consider requesting a copy of this document to inform the bakers of the details of the case.

Furthermore the Committee may wish to consider requesting the bakers to submit a cogent and detailed case stating what their actual needs are, why there should be derogations for drivers employed by NI bakers, and what this derogation should actually entail.

This would assist in consideration of the strength of the case already submitted by the DoE.

With the exception of articles 10(5), 26(3) and (4) and 7 which entered into force on 1 May 2006

## **Appendix 1**

### **EXEMPTIONS**

The following table shows the old exemptions in the left hand column, comparing them to those which came into force on 11 April 2007 in the right hand column.

Old Exemptions	New Exemptions
Vehicles used for the carriage of goods where the maximum permissible weight of the vehicle, including any trailer or semi-trailer, does not exceed 3.5 tonnes.	Although this exemption has been removed, the Regulation applies its scope to vehicles over 3.5 tonnes only.
Vehicles used for the carriage of Passengers with no more than 9 seats, including the driver's seat.	Although this exemption has been removed, the Regulation only applies its scope to vehicles with more than 9 seats (including the driver's seat).
