Recommendation	Update
Recommendation 1: Models of Immersion and School Structures	The specific needs of the sector are already factored into the Development Proposal process because each case is considered within its own context. In line with my Autumn Statement to the Assembly all future school provision will focus on the needs of pupils and the area planning process will provide an opportunity to determine the future needs of the sector.
Recommendation 2: Revising the Existing Policy on Funding for Pre- school Provision	This change in policy is already in place.
Recommendation 3: Necessary Preschool Experience	Already in place.
Recommendation 4: Pre-school Settings – Voluntary vs. Statutory	The Department's policy is that both the voluntary and statutory sectors are equally valued with both following common curriculum guidelines and being subject to the same inspection standards. On 20 January 2011 the then Minister announced a funding increase for voluntary/private pre-school providers in the Pre-School Education Expansion Programme (PSEEP) in line with a commitment in the draft Early Years (0-6) Strategy to improving equity and access to early years provision. An additional payment of £200 per funded place was made to all private/voluntary pre-school settings in the PSEEP, for the 2010-11 school year, with a total commitment of £1.5m.
